## Post-Secondary Planning Checklist

## Testing: Required:

STAAR End-of-Course Exam: U.S. History

**Strongly Recommended:** 

ACT, SAT, or TSIA-2 School Day testing in the Spring

August
Check to see that you are scheduled for the correct courses.
Know your college entry test scores, rank and GPA.
September
Obtain the catalogs/brochures from the technical/vocational/business schools and colleges/universities which interests you.
Match Technical, Vocational, and Business School programs, Two Year Degree, and Four Year Degree
options to your career interests to make informed decisions.
Plan for college bound testing: 4 year schools typically require SAT/ACT. 2 year schools require TSIA.
October
Attend the College Fair/Career Night and learn about the different colleges and universities.
November
Meet with your campus career/college center advisor.
Keep your grades up and stay involved.
December
Know your GPA and how it is calculated.
For student athletes interested in playing collegiate sports, enroll in NCAA. See your coach/counselor.
January
Begin planning your personal essays for college and scholarship applications
Register for the SAT or ACT to take in the Spring School Day at COHS or on a Sat). Ask about fee waivers
from your counselor if you are taking the test on a Saturday.
Practice to improve your SAT scores using Schmoop and Khan Academy or other free online programs.
February
Ask for verification of community service and keep it in your portfolio/folder.

Complete the Course Selection Sheet for your senior year classes; consider Dual Credit or AP.
Take the School Day College Entry Exam offered to all juniors (SAT/ACT/TSIA-2).
Take the ASVAB.
Research entry requirements of universities/colleges of your choice.
March
Determine colleges for your Reach, Target and Safe School list.
If possible, visit the colleges that most interest you. You may use two college days your Junior Year.
If enrolled in a CTE Program of Study course, ensure you are taking the aligned Industry Certification.
April
Check that your graduation requirements are in order.
Do your best on college bound testing: SAT/ACT/TSIA. Determine if you want to retest.
May
Do your best on state assessments/STAAR/EOC and AP Testing.
Consider retaking SAT/ACT for better scores; Remember to select the colleges to receive your
scores during registration.
Review your graduation plan and academic record to ensure that you are on track for graduation.
June
Visit the colleges you are interested in attending.
Become familiar with the district website resources so you can research college and career information:
Texas Gear Up. Texas On Course. Texas Reality Check. Major Clarity.
Work on college admission essays.
The high school transcript you receive at the end of your junior year is the one you will use for college
applications. You will receive your transcript in the mail.
Update your resume and log of volunteer activities.
Check your portfolio and make sure you have your records in order with SAT and/or ACT scores,
essays, resume, record of your volunteer work, and record of your employment (if applicable).
Begin to research scholarship opportunities on web sites, and in your campus Counselor's Suite.
